You find deep satisfaction in building a shy child's confidence or teaching a mistrustful child to relax and share.

You are really good at leading the children in creative play, encouraging them to let their imaginations run wild and to gently explore their fears and desires. Acting out nursery rhymes and telling stories where every child contributes a few lines to the plot are favourite activities. Dressing up and making masks and puppets are wildly popular and often end up in giggling fits. Sometimes the kids sit back and you act out a fairy tale for them, playing all the roles with different voices and miming the actions. They love it and you don't mind the applause one bit.

Of course there are meals to be served, disputes to settle, accidents to clean up, and knees to bandage, but that's all water under the bridge by the time the parents come to collect their children. It's quite a physical job too, with all the bending and lifting small people need, but you like staying in shape. Besides, for you and the kids—the play's the thing!
