Job Description

Your main post is a well organized desk in the reception area of the planning offices, surrounded by poster size aerial photographs of the city as it has grown over the years. In the main planning room the wall art is more practical—zoning maps, huge blueprints and diagrams of the town's water and sewerage systems and power plants. Colourful pie charts of demographic statistics festoon another wall alongside roadmaps that are so detailed they include manhole covers and traffic lights.

You answer or refer questions from people who call and visit the office. Clients are always more than satisfied at the courteous way that you answered their questions. It could be quite a detailed request from a developer or a scout for a company that is thinking about doing business here. Some planning information is confidential, but you do your best with what is available and spend a lot of time updating files and databases. The work ties in perfectly with your studies at university.

Council and the planning team also give you research and fact-finding tasks to assist their decision making. There is a light industrial park in the pre-planning stages. You are checking that all the information on file about this area is completely accurate and up-to-date before the team gets down to work on drafting the new zone. You have called the registry office about deeds and engineering about the status of roads and utilities. Other items are added daily as queries come up in meetings.
